- The martyrdom of Palestinian detainee Sami Abed Al-Emour inside the Israeli occupation prisons as a result of willful medical negligence.
- The victory of the will... The detained engineer, Alaa Al-Araj, suspended his 103-day hunger strike after obtaining an agreement to end his administrative detention.
- •The captive movement: "The practices of the occupation and the administration of its prisons with the detainee, the martyr Sami Al-Emour, demonstrate that a real execution was carried out against him, and a new confirmation of the systematic policy of medical neglect."
- The Occupation Court rejects the petition submitted for the release of the hungerstriking detainee, Kayed Al-Fasfous, It is noteworthy that this is the fourth petition submitted to a the detainee Al-Fasfous during the period of his hunger strike.


## **DETAINEES**

continue their open hunger strike in the Israeli occupation prisons.



- Khaled, brother of the captive on hunger strike, Kayed Al-Fasfous: "My brother lost the ability to speak, in conjunction with the failure of his internal organs, and the doctors told Kayed that his health condition is very critical, especially after the failure of the liver and kidneys and the weakness of his heart muscle."
- Brother of the detainee, Kayed Al-Fasfous: Doctors told Kayed that he is close to sudden death at any moment after signs of a blood clot appear.
- The striking detainee Louay Al-Ashqar suffers from a difficult health condition in the cells of Al-Jalama prison as a result of his open hunger strike. He refuses to take medicines, undergo medical examinations, and stops drinking water.
- A state of extreme tension prevails in the prison.. "Ashkelon" prison detainees burn one of the prison facilities, in protest against the death of detainee Sami Al-Emour.
- The detainee, Ayman Al-Sharbati, nicknamed "The Citizen", was transferred to solitary confinement after the prison detainees burned one of its facilities in protest against the martyrdom of detainee Sami Al-Emour.
- The health condition of the detainee, Tariq Mahmoud Assi (39 years), from Nablus, who is in Nafha prison, has deteriorated. The prison administration takes blood samples

- repeatedly without explaining to him the reasons, and without transferring him to the hospital, In addition, he suffers from constant weight loss.
- The occupation extends the detention of engineer Muhammad al-Halabi from Gaza for 90 days, as the 167th session was held for him today, and the occupation continues to pressure him to accept a deal, in return al-Halabi refuses to admit any of the charges against him.
- The occupation prisons administration has been ignoring the case of the detainee, Mahmoud Fares, 28, from Salfit Governorate, who has been complaining of cancer in the lymph nodes since 2017, and has undergone several surgeries and several chemotherapy sessions, the last of which was 6 months before his arrest.
- The Israeli occupation returns the detainee Ziyad Al-Shati from Jenin to Al-Jalameh interrogation center, two days after he was transferred to the Rambam Hospital in Haifa due to the deterioration of his health condition, as he underwent a court session today at Salem Military Court, and his detention was extended for another week.
- Jerusalemite detainee Ameen Shweiki continues his strike for diabetes treatment for the 65th consecutive day, in protest of his administrative detention.
